#### What does non-proprietary mean to Woodwork Standards users?

"The use of non-proprietary standards by ANSI and other groups is essential in the specification writing process, so that the end user can know and trust the source of the information. As a specification writer/ architect I depend on these non-proprietary standards for unbiased information when writing technical specifications for products and procedures." -John Dunaway, FCSI, CCS, CDT, AIA, Canizaro-Cawthon-Davis

In 2016, when AWI started on its path to revise architectural woodwork standards, great care was taken to use a process that would ensure absolute integrity of the new standard. Over the years, standards users have expressed their desire for an ANSI Standard for architectural woodwork, so it was not difficult to choose the path of becoming an ANSI Accredited Standards Developer Organization (SDO).

In previous editions of architectural woodwork standards, a select group of association volunteers spent countless hours of their time to contribute first-hand industry knowledge of joinery techniques and materials over a wide array of woodwork products. As often as was possible, real data and scientific studies could be included to give the specifier and fabricator solid background on which to build products. However, lacking from this process was the ability to create standards in an open and inclusive environment where industry stakeholders could widely contribute and approve a consensus based architectural woodwork standard.

When something goes wrong, the first thing anyone wants to know is if anyone got hurt, what the damage is going to cost and then consequently, who is to pay for it. Since our litigious society demands to know whose fault it is before anything else can happen, it doesn't help anyone's case when the standards used are ambiguous, in conflict with itself or other standards and lacking in testing data.

What leg does anyone have to stand on when there is no evidence to back up someone's claim of sufficient manufacturing methods and materials in joinery? Needless hours of debate, guesswork and finger pointing can be avoided by referencing standards that have testing data to support a claim that the cabinet will perform as expected. But, how do you know who to trust in this?

One of the requirements that establishes the integrity of the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) is Openness, which means sharing our development process and seeking additional input and review from industry members. Now we are including specific groups of Users, Producers, General Interest and Subject Experts who review and contribute in an organized and documented process that is open to all.

Steve Gantner, RA, CSI, CCS, CCCA, SCIP, AGCMO says, "Non-proprietary standards are important for specificationsjust like third party inspections are for Owners and Code Officials. It's not the fox guarding the henhouse, it is truly a collaborative effort that gets the best in the industry together to do what is right and in the interest of ALL parties, not just a singular entity."

Additionally, "Lack of Dominance" means "No one acts alone". This is a big departure from previous Technical Committee or Joint Standards Committee convened 3-5 times per year to talk about changes in the standard's content.

Now we have teams for everything.

- An Administrative Team to handle ANSI administrative actions, documentation, compliance measures and notifications to those who need to offer input.
- An Editorial Team to gather the raw information and determine how to write, sort and organize the content.
- A Technical Committee ensures the whole industry is included with a focus on harmonizing with other related and complimentary ANSI Standards.
- The Testing Team to perform testing and gather performance data.
- Subject Expert Review Teams who review and suggest improvements to draft standards
- Canvassee's who review, consider and vote on the draft standards.

ANSI requirements are the strongest reasons for improved standards development. Together with the other requirements, such as Notifications of Standards Development, Consideration of Views and Objections,

Consensus voting, Evidence of compliance with anti-trust laws, Patent policies, all combine in a prescribed process which makes the AWI standards Non-Proprietary. No one company, person, Chapter, organization or related industry has dominance to assert their product or service as superior.


"Architects, Engineers, and Specifiers can't personally test every item that goes into our buildings and we want satisfied owners and clients. With any construction project, products and materials must be right for the circumstances. They must be reliable, dependable, and correct. Non-proprietary standards, such as those established by ASTM or ANSI. are the only way to guarantee those products and materials do not favor one manufacturer over another, that they will perform as required, and that the client receives the best value for their investment". -Lynn A. Javoroski, FCSI, CCS, LEED AP BD+C, Associate AIA


Realizing that woodwork standards developed in an approved ANSI process makes it more desirable for use and adoption on a global scale, AWI converted ALL DIMENSIONS present within the Standards and Glossary from Standard Imperial (SI) to Metric. The switch from fractions to decimals makes it possible to for individuals to specify, design and detail in one country, then fabricate and install custom woodwork nearly anywhere in the world.

"A Standard that is developed by a non-proprietary source reduces the appearance of and the opportunity for bias in the data for the subject referenced. Standards from a proprietary source can be called into question by those that don't meet the standard, possibly for legitimate reasons. This conflict can require additional time for a project team to research and investigate the issue to reach a decision. An independent Standard from a nonproprietary source also eliminates the appearance of bias or favoritism by a project team." -Kermit Duncan, AIA, FCSI, CCCA, NCARB, Miller Dunwiddie

In the new suite of AWI Standards, AWI is using the ANSI process to establish industry-wide consensus and transparency in the standards development process. The new AWI Standards trade in prescriptive requirements for performance-based measures that provide design professionals, manufacturers, suppliers, installers, and users with more flexibility, value, and room for innovation.

To ensure up-to-date compliance during the transitionary period, specifiers should specify compliance with "AWI Standards, Current Edition."

Until the date on which the new AWI Standards take effect, architectural woodwork industry professionals will continue to use the AWS Ed.2, Redline Version to access the requirements for their projects.

This appointment followed ten years of service to the City of Brentwood, where he was the director of one of Tennessee's premier public libraries. Public Library for nine years, and, before that, Head Reference Librarian at the Western Reserve Historical Society.

He is a native of Cleveland Ohio and a summa cum laude graduate of Case Western Reserve Univeristy, with master's degrees in history and library science. His undergraduate work was done at Ohio University in Athens, where he earned a B.S. in Journalism. He is currently an adjunct faculty member at Jackson State Community College (TN) in the distance learning program.

Chuck is an avid genealogist and author of more than 20 books of Tennessee history and genealogy. Since 2002 he has been the editor of the "Middle Tennessee Journal of History and Genealogy."
